Refugee Quarantine Kits Delivered

Jacques and Stephanie Bora (pictured above) were one of many families that received surprise deliveries of food, cleaning and hygiene supplies and activities this Christmas.



First Presbyterian, Wichita, found out about the grant opportunity & jumped on board. We attended a focus group hosted by the Kansas Non-Profit Chamber, and quickly submitted our grant application. Helping our refugee families is one of our core mission projects, so finding a way to help them during the pandemic was a natural fit. Many refugee families are already food insecure and the virus made a tough situation worse. With grant awarded, the Mission Commission and volunteers swung into action shopping, packing and delivering. Each family received 4 large bins of food and supplies, based on the size of the family. And, most importantly, each family received information from the CDC about Covid, translated into Swahili—something that's not readily available. It took a lot of hours from a crew of dedicated volunteers to
